Also kinda cook Pit-Pat from Mr. Show was a big inspiration for this character's design. CAAAN DO!







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GROMFLOMITES

"They're just robots, Morty! It's okay to shoot them, they're robots! "These bug-eyed minions are not just an enemy of Rick, they also suck at the loyalty teat of the Galactic Federation. Designwise, there's two types of Gromfiomites: the grunts, who are winged, less evolved worker bugs (*directly below*), and the leading upper class, who are a little more evolved, more bipedal, and don't have wings.

KROMboPulos Michael

"Oh boy, here I go killing again!" Now don't be fooled: Krombopulos Michael (voiced by Andy Daly) might look like an upper-class Gromflomite, but he's actually a rogue assassin working against the Federation. He also buys illegal guns from Rick with cold, hard flerbos.



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Interdimensional Cable

"I'm Ants in My Eyes Johnson, everything's black, I can't see a thing!" In addition to being absolutely freaking nuts, the production flow for these episodes is way different. The majority of the sketches are not scripted—it's just Justin making them up in the booth while getting drunk. After that, it goes out to the artists, who painstakingly design and draw what they think he's talking about in his ramblings. We then pair up those sketches with a really good "A story" that's actually scripted by the writters.





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Artistically, the cable episodes were an opportunity for the show's style to take a jump. Especially later in the season, it was really fun for everyone to take a break and try something totally different. *Two Brothers* is a perfect example—the art direction for this sketch was done by Juan Meza-León. He went nuts and storyboarded it in his style, adding this cool graphic novel feel. It was so good, Justin had the artists just clean it up and copy exactly what he boarded.
